What Is A Pyx

In the Catholic faith, the Eucharist is considered to be the body and blood of Jesus Christ, and receiving Holy Communion is a central aspect of the Mass. However, certain circumstances may prevent individuals from physically attending Mass. In such cases, Communion is brought to them in a pyx (pronounced “picks”). The significance of the pyx lies in its ability to bring the presence of Christ to those unable to be physically present in the church. It represents the care and concern of the Church for its members, ensuring that no one is left out or deprived of the spiritual nourishment provided by the Eucharist.

Understanding the significance and purpose of the pyx can deepen our appreciation for the sacredness of the Eucharist.

The word pyx is Greek for a receptacle, made of wood from the paksos (box-tree) and was used to contain the Blessed Eucharist. It was perhaps the commonest term applied to the cup in which the Blessed Sacrament actually rested when in the Middle Ages it was suspended above the altar. In later times however the term pyx is limited in ordinary usage to that smaller vessel of gold or silver, in which the Eucharist is commonly carried to the sick.

Faith Formation News

The first part of March I attended a gathering at the diocese. Cardinal Thomas Collins was the speaker. The Cardinal has written a Pastoral Letter on the Sacred Heart of Jesus. While I was away on vacation, I had time to read the Pastoral Letter and reflect on the Sacred Heart of Jesus. I am finding that this letter and time of reflection is helping me prepare to enter Palm Sunday and into Holy Week, into the great love and sacrifice of Jesus Christ.

“The heart is a natural sign of true love: it is hidden, it is steady, and it is reliable. As it beats, moment by moment, day by day, year by year, it keeps us alive. That is true love, not the sentiment that deceives, nor the passing infatuation that blows away like a cloud. That is the Sacred Heart of Jesus, steady and true, and that is what we must take to heart. Our life of Christian discipleship must be guided by the profound vision of love represented by the Sacred Heart.”

“The Sacred Heart image shows **the heart wounded**, and this reminds us of a scriptural foundation of the devotion, the reference in John 19:34 to the lance piercing the side of Christ on the cross. From this verse there developed Christian meditation upon the wounds of Christ, especially the wound to the heart, from which, the Gospel states, flowed blood and water.”

“The Sacred Heart is portrayed as **encircled by a crown of thorns**. As with the wound in the heart, the crown of thorns reminds us that real love, faithful love, totally committed love for others, can lead to rejection and suffering. If we only act in order to attract applause, and shift our principles to guarantee that approval, we will never truly live or love at all, and we will lose our very self. Real love is inseparable from integrity, and may well include a crown of thorns, which reminds us of the cost of discipleship.”

“The Sacred Heart is **surmounted by a cross**, the primary symbol of Christian faith: it draws us to contemplate sacrificial love of Jesus, as he lays down his life for us on the cross. In a world that would crucify an innocent man, Jesus returns love for hatred and says: “Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.” (Luke 23:34) The love represented by the Sacred Heart is that sacrificial love, which is centered not on self, but on others. We must go and do likewise.”

“The Sacred Heart is **surrounded by flames**. These flames of glory, for love of the quality represented by the love of Jesus is truly glorious. They are flames that provide light in a

world darkened by sin, and warmth in a world that too often is cold, that treats people as things to be used, not as persons to be loved. They are flames of zeal, sign of the fire that came down upon the disciples at Pentecost, as they were sent out to set the world on fire for Christ, as are we all.”

“Sometimes, **Jesus points to the Sacred Heart**, inviting us to come to him when we labour and are heavy laden; sometimes **the arms of Jesus reach outward**, welcoming everyone, as he calls us to do. The Sacred Heart is a powerful symbol of the love of Jesus, which each of us was commissioned to make present in this world on the day we were baptized. More than every before, our fractious world now needs the love symbolized by the Sacred Heart of Jesus.” (Heart Speaks to Heart, A Pastoral Letter on the Sacred Heart of Jesus, by Cardinal Thomas Collins, Archbishop of Toronto)

Finally let me offer you these final lines from Mother Mary Magdalen who died in 1960. She was a Passionist nun from Spain and a spiritual writer. This letter was to her spiritual director. “May the great mysteries of Gethsemane, the trail, and Calvary unfold in our hearts because of their intimate union with Jesus. And when our beloved has expired on the cross, may our hearts be his tomb, closed to everything else, until our eyes see his glorified wounds.”
