Christ is Risen Alleluia! He is Risen indeed Alleluia! Happy Easter to you all! May we all rejoice for the next 50 days as we celebrate the Easter season together. Have you ever thought about when the Blessed Mother found out about the Resurrection of her son? During the Advent season as I was praying the Glories mysteries I wondered about when Mary found out about Jesus rising from the dead?

My spiritual director and I had an incredible conversation surrounding this question about the Blessed Mary. Several Saints have had visions of Jesus going first to his Blessed Mother after he rose from the dead. The Risen Lord spends some length of time with her as she weeps for joy after seeing him die on the cross and now holding him. Some of the saints include St Bridget of Sweden, St Ignatius of Loyola and Pope St Paul II also wrote about the Blessed Mother seeing the Risen Christ first. Servant of God John Hardon in the 20th century, who at Pope St Pual VI's request wrote The Catholic Catechism (1975) was of the same belief. "It is not only pious opinion that the Risen Saviour first appeared to His Mother Mary on Easer Sunday. No less than six Doctors of the Church, including Sts. Ambrose, Anselm and Albert the Great held that Our Lady was the first witness of the Resurrection."

Something to reflect and ponder over the next 50 days of the Easter Season.

VOTIVE CANDLES

A votive candle is a small candle that holds special significance in Catholicism. Here are some key points about votive candles:

Symbol of Prayer and Devotion: Votive candles are a symbol of prayer and devotion. When people light these candles, they do so to express their prayers or devotion to a particular saint, intention, or cause.

The candle continues to burn for several hours or days (depending on its size). Even after the person who lit it leaves, the candle's flame symbolizes their ongoing prayer and love.

Biblical Roots: The practice of lighting votive candles has its roots in the concept of a "burnt offering" from the Old Testament. In ancient times, valuable items were burned as offerings to God.

Offering to God: Catholics who light votive candles are making an offering to God. The candle's flame represents ardent love, and its consumption symbolizes the offering of something valuable to God—whether it's our time, praise, or resources.

Lingering Quality: The lingering glow of the candle signifies that our prayers, concerns, and praises continue in our hearts even after we leave the church. "Remember me, Lord, and remember my prayers."

Remember that votive candles play an essential role in Catholic worship, serving as a tangible expression of faith and devotion.
